Sentences vs. Fragments

- A **sentence** is a complete idea:
 - While walking to school, Sam saw eighteen squirrels.
 - Sam saw eighteen squirrels.
 - The teacher gives homework, unless the students finish in class.
 - The teacher gives homework.
- A **fragment** is NOT a complete idea. Imagine if the speaker walked away. . . would you understand what they were talking about?
 - While walking to school,
 - Unless the students finish in class.

A sentence always contains a **subject** and a **verb**.

- The quick brown **fox** **jumped** over the lazy dog.
- The quick, brown **fox**, that lives in the hole by the old oak tree, **jumped** over the lazy dog.
- At dusk, the quick, brown **fox**, that lives in the hole by the old oak tree, **jumped** over the lazy dog.
- At dusk, the quick, brown **fox**, that lives in the hole by the old oak tree, **jumped** over the lazy dog, while it napped.

A **fragment** may be missing a subject or a verb or both; or it may contain both, but begin with a subordinating conjunction. It's NOT a complete idea.
