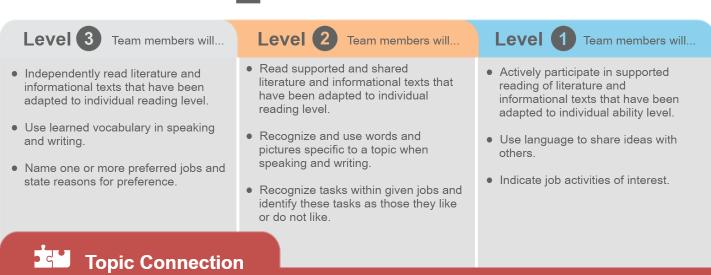

Instructional Routine



Before Reading

- Introduce the Topic Words: important, interests, job, needs, skills, team and work.
- Introduce the reading by asking a focus question such as, "What is one thing you should know when trying to find the right job—your skills or your internet password?" Discuss team members' responses and whether they know what their work skills are. Explain that this lesson will focus on finding a job that is a good match with your skills, interests and needs.
- Preview the article. Point out that the illustrations/symbols show things about finding a good job match. Say, "Today, we are going to read about finding the right job for you. Your job is to remember one thing that a person should know about themselves to find the right job.
- Review the learning goal with team members: I will remember one thing a person should know about themselves to find the right job.

Model Fluent Reading

Read aloud with fluency and expression.

During Reading

 During reading, call attention to the things a person should know about themselves when looking for the right job by emphasizing the words 'skills', 'interests' and 'needs'.

Define New Vocabulary

- Identify words that are new or may have more than one meaning.
- Use context of the article to define the words and the meaning of the sentence.
- Summarize the content of each page.

Build Comprehension

• Talk with team members about concepts presented in the article. Ask, "When looking for the right job, why is it important to know your skills, interests and needs? What could happen if you don't know these things?"

After Reading

• Revisit the learning goal. Ask, "What is one thing a person should know about themselves to find the right job?"

- Level 3: Have the team member describe things a person should know about themselves to find the right job. For example, say, "When looking for the right job, what do you need to know about yourself?"
- Level 2: Have the team member identify one thing a person should know about themselves when looking for the right job. Picture supports such as the Communication Board or the article illustrations may be used as needed.
- Level 1: Have the team member select one thing a person should know when looking for the right job from a field of 2-3 choices (or single choice). For example, display the symbols for 'skills' and 'needs'. Ask, "What should you know to find the right job?"
- Discuss the article with emphasis on the importance of matching a future job to your skills, interests and needs.

Before Reading

- Introduce the article by having team members share what they know about finding a job.
- Discuss the Topic Words: important, interests, job, needs, skills, team and work. Ask what team members think each word means.
- Review the learning goal with team members: I will read the article.

During Reading

- Listen as team members read quietly to themselves.
- Monitor print concepts and fluency.
- Model, prompt or support use of skills and strategies.

After Reading

- Revisit the learning goal and talk with team members about the article.
- Have team members locate the Topic Words: important, interests, job, needs, skills, team and work.
- Have team members summarize the events in the article.



Introduce the article by having team

- members share what they have learned about finding a job.
- Use the Topic Words: important, interests, job, needs, skills, team and work in conversation about the article. Help team members find the words in the article.
- Review the learning goal with team members: I will read the article.

During Reading

- Read aloud while team members follow along.
- Provide supports that allow team members to join in the reading. Supports may include choral reading, echo reading or use of a voice output device or eye gaze board.
- Monitor print concepts and fluency.
- Model and support use of skills and strategies.



After Reading

- Revisit the learning goal and talk with team members about the article.
- Have team members locate the Topic Words: important, interests, job, needs, skills, team and work.
- Have team members summarize the events in the article.

 why they may or may not be interested in certain jobs. Tell team members, "It is your job to choose a job
 you would like and reasons for liking that job."
- Review the learning goal with team members: I will choose a job I like and reasons for liking that job.

Model

- Use the Transition Passport or other individualized vocational data to review jobs that team members have previously discussed or experienced. Refer to the Job Interest Survey Summary Log to revisit the jobs presented in previous lessons. As you reference these materials, talk about trends in the survey results. For example, you can say, "It looks like I am interested in jobs that involve using tools, like building and car repair. Maybe I should look at other jobs that would involve the use of tools, like gardening."
- Display the Job Preference Activity. Model how to identify other jobs that might match your interest in tools or other appropriate interests.
- Model filling in the rest of the activity as you identify why you may or may not like certain jobs

Provide each team member with the Job Preference Activity. Choose the most appropriate activity format on the basis of each team member's skills and needs.

Provide Practice

- **Level 3:** Have the team member name one or more preferred jobs and state reasons for preference by completing the Job Preference Activity.
- **Level 2:** Have the team member recognize tasks within given jobs and identify these tasks as those they like or do not like by completing the Job Preference Activity.
- **Level 1:** Have the team member indicate job activities of interest from a field of 2-3 (may be errorless choice) by completing the Job Preference Activity using communication technology and picture supports as needed.

Review

- Revisit the learning goal. Talk with team members about how knowing our job interests and preferences can help our teams when we start looking for jobs or volunteer opportunities in the community.
- Use the activity to encourage team members to think about jobs they may not have thought about before. Remind team members that sometimes our interests change after we try a job.

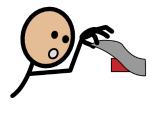

Finding the Right Job for You





Finding a job can be hard work. There are many different kinds of jobs. It is important to find a job that is right for you. The right job is a job that matches with your skills, interests and needs.

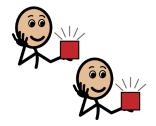






Skills are things you have learned how to do. Some skills you learned in school like reading, writing, adding and subtracting. These are important skills. There are other important skills too. Being creative, knowing when to talk and when to listen, working together with others on a team and completing a job are all important skills.

Interests are things you enjoy. If you have a job that you like, then you will want to work more. If you enjoy talking with people and helping them with an issue, you may want to work in a retail store rather than a warehouse. You may like to work inside rather than outside, or you may like to move around and walk instead of sitting at a desk. It is important that you and your transition team know what your interests are. This will help the team find the right job for you.









Needs are things you must have in order to do your job. Everyone has different needs. It is important to know your needs. You may have a need for help with speaking, seeing or hearing. You may need directions with pictures and words. You may need to sit instead of stand. You may need to use a calculator when counting out change for a customer. You must advocate and speak up for your needs at a job.

When you are ready to work, you will want to find a job that is right for you. Remember the right job matches your skills, interests and needs. It is important to know your skills, interests and needs. It is important to tell your team your skills, interests and needs. Then you will find the right job for you!







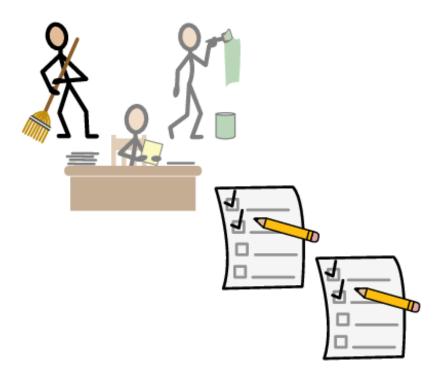
